#### **General Instructions**

The team's job is to 1) describe an ethical problem the organization is facing and 2) propose a solution to that problem. They should describe the legal, business and ethical dimensions of the problem and show how their solution addresses legal issues, makes sense financially, and is ethically sound.

The team should inform you of your "business identity" and their "business identity." Who are they in this roleplay, e.g., ethics department, outside management consultants, other?

Teams have been encouraged to handle the ethical issues in simple, common sense language, meaning they should translate any technical ethical issues into everyday language appropriate to an executive audience. They should be persuasive and have strong presentation skills.

### **Legal Dimension**

Please base your score on how well the team answered the following questions:

- Is the problem brought about by any laws or regulations having been broken?
- Do any laws or regulations determine or limit what the organization/industry may or may not do to resolve the problem?
- Do any major court cases determine or limit what the organization may do to resolve the problem?
- Is there any likelihood of lawsuits?
- Is the solution legal?
- If no laws or cases apply, did the team make this clear?
